





A Stone's Throw Away - Ron Ledoux Quartet

A Stone's Throw Away is the glorious sound of a rhythm section centering tastefulness and synergy in their playing. Simplicity is key here; the listener is never at any point overwhelmed with sound, and the musicians make a point of ceding space to each other whenever needed. This creates a unique feeling of cleanliness, by removing all superfluous clutter in the arrangements and ensuring no ideas are suppressed.



Concerning the ideas present on the album, it's a goldmine of infectious melody writing. It is quite the feat that across 11 tracks (all of which were composed by guitarist Ron Ledoux and arranged by bassist Gilbert Joanis), neither the qualities of originality nor sophistication diminish in the slightest. It's truly one of those albums that leaves an indelible enough impression to the point where the entire track list is immediately singable upon initial exposure. From the tenderness of *Windmills* to the unison guitar/bass chorus in *Get It Out of Here*, the consistency is astounding. The phrases are structured in a way that they possess a vague sense of familiarity and nostalgia, almost making it feel like these songs have existed since the beginning of time.

The band's approach to improvising complements the existing moods perfectly, opting for concision and clarity as points of emphasis. Joanis and drummer Rich Irwin's musical bond borders on the clairvoyant at times and adds another level of vitality to the music.

Fourth Impressions et Late'Ish News

Youngins, Nomecarde et Pourpre

Il est assez amusant de constater à l'audition que ce disque fut presque saisi en direct. Ron Ledoux Quartet - A Stone's Throw Away

Ron Ledoux is a guitarist from Stanstead, Quebec and this (his debut release) caught my attention. The album opens with a percolating bass solo courtesy of Gilbert Joanis, followed by swirling Hammond organ from Paul Shrofel, before we finally hear the guitarist at about 2:30 into the track. Ledoux is worth the wait. With a classic jazz tone and shades of Wes Montgomery and Grant Green, Fourth Impression kicks off the record with a bang. Drummer Rich Irwin lays it down with precision and groove throughout.

Other highlights include the laid-back Windmills, Noted in Blue and the Scofield-ish Get It Out of Here.

Listen to A Stone's Throw Away

The composer and guitarist Ron Ledoux brings along Paul Shrofel (keys), Gilbert Joanis (bass, arrangements), and Rich Irwin (drums) for this first rate jazz listen, where each of the 11 songs carves a very distinct and unique path.


"Fourth Impression" starts the listen and makes quite an impression with its swift and spirited guitar alongside frisky drumming and groove friendly bass lines, and "Late'ish News" follows with a warm melody guiding the timeless jazz flavor.

Near the middle, "Windmills" flows with an emotive,

introspective demeanor that's packed with much beauty, while "Granny's Squeaker Chair" integrates the guitar and bass in a way that's playful but also very mature. "Noted In Blue", the best track here, then moves quick with cozy jazz energy that will get your body moving.

The last 2 tracks, "Get It Out Of Here" and "Pourpe", don't disappoint either, where the former glides with all the players contributing their respective strengths, and the latter burns slow, powerfully and with a dreamy appeal amid creative songwriting.

A listen that's full of both swinging fun and moments of sublime intimacy, Ledoux and company don't waste a second on this debut that's hopefully the first of many to come.

There is often something potentially terrific about guitarbased jazz. Thus also in the case here. The two Canadians - guitarist and composer Ron Ledoux and bassist and arranger Gilbert Joanis have created at least eleven captivating, new tracks.

A Stone's Throw Away is Ledoux's debut album, but the level he and the quartet - which also consists of Paul Shrofel on keys and Rich Irwin on drums - sets out with not only makes the current listening experience intense, it also bodes well for the future.

For Ledoux and Joanis have not only created some solidly swinging jazz numbers, the quartet as a whole also makes the material alive, vital and vibrant. In particular, Ledoux's own guitar riffs should be highlighted - they exude authority and familiarity with the instrument. And when they are supported by, for example, Shrofel's strokes on various keyboards, it tears and flakes in one. A number like Youngins is a good example. The number is in a way simple, but you are torn into the ornaments, the nooks and crannies, the facets.

And I undeniably find joy in that.

Montreal-based guitarist <u>Ron Ledoux</u> surrounded himself with three excellent musicians to create this album consisting entirely of original jazz compositions.



Ron finds himself with electric bass and keyboards, along with drums, for this quartet setting which perhaps provides the album a somewhat more "modern" sound to it.

The opening cut, "Fourth Impression", is a clear nod to Coltrane's "Impressions". Based on a minor progression, the melody is extremely catchy (ear-worm alert, you've been warned!). Chatting with Ledoux at one of his regular gigs, he explained that he tried to include a few originals that are based on a common form. The result is an album that starts off with a definite bang.

After two straight-ahead compositions, "Late'ish News" and "Non Chalensky", Ron serves up a ¾ time tune titled "Windmills". This tune holds up well in this quartet setting as well as in the live minimalist setting that I heard it during a guitar/bass set in Old Montreal.

In this context playing original compositions, Ledoux employs a more lyrical approach to his improvisations, although he is no stranger to the bebop language. He is a versatile guitarist with the academic credentials of a university degree in music as well as a background supporting a wide spectrum of musical contexts.

Returning to a common form, "Youngins" is a blues with another catchy head. Ledoux certainly has a knack for creating a theme attached to a common form that the listener will immediately relate to. The soloing on this tune – as well as on the opener "Fourth Impression" – illustrates the ability of these musicians to explore playing "outside", albeit for only brief moments.

On "Granny's Squeaky Chair", Ledoux's tone is drastically different. He explained that he turned to his Ibanez Scofield model for this tune. This is another genre of the jazz spectrum that has always interested him. Perhaps another album may be in the offering consisting entirely of this style of jazz as the compositions are already written.


"Nomecarde" is a return to a swing feel to begin the second half of this very enjoyable album.

"Noted In Blue" starts off with an intro that is reminiscent of the Monk tune "Well You Needn't" and is perhaps another nod to a great master.

After two more straight-ahead originals, "Sunday & Strollin" and "Get It Out of Here", Ledoux closes out this eleven tune offering with a return to the Scofield-esq "Pourpre".

I found *A Stone's Throw Away* to be quite an enjoyable album showcasing a guitarist who has found his voice through original compositions and his own lyrical improvisational style.
